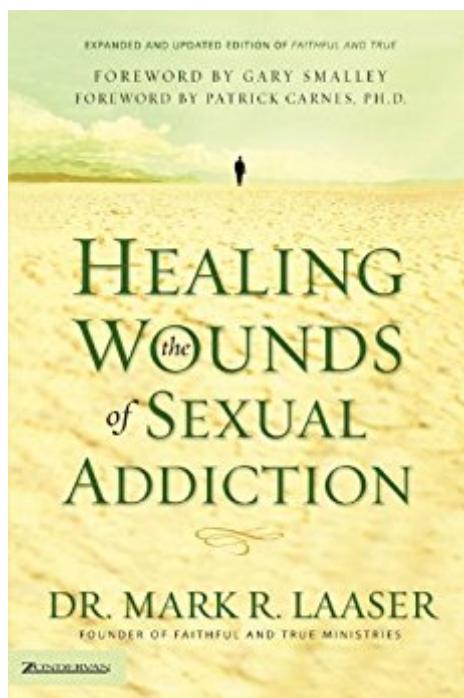

I've been a secular counselor/ therapist for over 30 years, and a Christian counselor for 13 years. This is the best book I have read that clearly explains addictions. It is specific to sexual addictions, but explains all addictions and successful recovery options, in an understandable way. I highly recommend it for anyone needing help with sexual addiction or any addiction. I also urge all professionals, clergy or lay counselors to read and use this book when talking and praying with anyone discussing addiction issues - clients, friends or family members.

One of the hardest groups of individuals with sex addiction are those within the Christian church. One would be astonished to know the high percentage of individuals in church suffer from addiction to pornography, and other sexual acting out. The surprise is because this problem is not an issue anyone talks about. It is okay to ask for help for addiction to drugs, alcohol, tobacco, even food, but there is tremendous fear to admit to being in the grip of sexual addition. If the members of the congregation are too ashamed to admit their addiction, how much more so those of the clergy. Such people are the brunt of crude and cruel jokes and are chased from the church. This is what makes his book such a gem. Here is a pastor, once driven from his ministry due to his own sex addition, a man who almost lost his family and all that was precious to him, who has the courage to take up a ministry toward Christians with sex addictions. There is particular value in reading about how to recover from sex addiction from a Christian perspective. This book goes beyond the usual "pray and believe" simplicity and digs into a real, meaningful, spiritual, day-by-day approach to mastering this insidious addiction.

Poorly written, does not cite his sources, contradicts many of his statements given on YouTube and the internet and he refers to all sex addicts when describing some of their behaviors or reasons for becoming a sex addict. Does not talk about how he made his victims feel, or what he did after his one month of treatment that got him to become completely sober after 25 years of being a sex addict. Gives too many explanations for the behaviors of sex addicts without any concrete information he acquired through research. This book is based too much on his opinion instead of

research. Not a scholarly written book.

This book will help anyone who wants to understand and heal from sexual addiction. After 32 years of marriage, I found out my husband was a sexual addict. I was so broken and have been desperate to understand my husband's behavior. Mark Laaser, a recovered sexual addict, does an excellent job of explaining how someone can become a sexual addict, and how a person can recover and heal from the wounds that caused it. I am so grateful for this resource! My husband is now reading it. My husband is in a 12-step Celebrate Recovery program and sees a counselor. As Mr. Laaser points out, there is hope, help, and healing for sexual addiction.

This excellent little book embeds the processes of recovery from sexual addiction in a Christian perspective, without the "sin talk" that you would expect. Laaser takes the "higher power" rhetoric of 12-step programs and makes Biblical references to grace (to overcome the feelings of despair and shame that accompany addiction) and the abiding presence of God as a companion in the journey. There is an excellent section on couples in recovery, and some good advice on getting past the first several months (when the adrenaline rush keeps you honest) and settling in for the long haul. Like most books on this topic, the emphasis is on the compulsive sexual behaviors -- anonymous sex, masturbation, pornography, multiple adulteries -- and the emphasis is on controlling the behavior and overcoming the compulsion rather than making the core changes in self-image and self-awareness that is necessary to keep the addict from displacing the compulsive sexual activity into other behaviors. That's OK -- this is a book for personal recovery, not a counselor's guide for treating an addict. I have recommended this book to several Christian friends and pastors, and more than one Jewish therapist who has appreciated the stories of overcoming temptation that are in Hebrew scriptures.

This book hits the nail on the head by dealing with the roots of sexual addiction and giving practical steps toward recovery. If you are ready to be free, then do the hard work of examining your childhood for any abuse or neglect, whether real or perceived, and you'll discover the lies you tell yourself to find comfort in impurity. This is where the real challenge is because we are so afraid of feeling that pain again. But I'm here to tell you that the path to healing is through the pain and discomfort of processing those experiences. Know this...emotional pain will not kill you but the addiction will. You will need help from others to do this but you can and you must do it to rid yourself of this demon. The book gives you all the info and direction to do this.

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
