

Perfect

This book dabbles in a little bit of everything related to crafts. Although the focus is mostly on crafting with materials that can be re-purposed from the wild or that you can grow yourself, there are other recipes related to using items in your pantry. In 194 pages, the author discusses how to create a fairy garden, make a simple jam, work with pine cones, create natural dyes, grow certain foods such as beets, create lotions from items purchased in the grocery isle, knit a slouch hat with a circle loom, concoct a rosewater face toner, etc. Most items are simple and some other items are extremely simple, like making vanilla or cinnamon sugar. Since I already made vanilla sugar before, I made cinnamon sugar using her recipe which came out great. Cinnamon sugar is delicious on buttered toast. I can see myself one day making the Ã¢Âœ beach-in-a-jar coconut whip Ã¢ÂÂ or Ã¢Âœ Amy Ã¢ÂÂ Ã™ s red, white, and blue jam. Ã¢ÂÂ I read through many of the recipes and the caveats of each. For instance, in the recipe for the mango, coconut and beeswax lotion bars, she warns the crafter not to boil the mixture or it could explode. Although, the intro to each craft provides some good information, what I would have liked is some mention of whether the lotion and potion recipes can be mixed using my kitchen bowls that I use for food. I am wondering if I have to re-purpose some kitchen implements for just these tasks and retire them from food service. I refrained from trying those recipes because I do not have (nor do I want) a second set of kitchen tools and mixers dedicated solely to these recipes. In summary, this is a small crafting book with such varied craft ideas that there are sure to be two or more items that a beginner crafter (like me) will find useful. It does not go in-depth on anything but instead provides a smattering of suggestions on how to craft with nature and with items from your pantry. This, however, does not mean that the

crafts will be "free." Purchases will have to be made for many of the items being crafted—such as a circle loom for creating a slouch hat, scented oils for the lotions, etc.

I am terrible at putting things together, and wanted some inspiring ideas to help me along when trying to put together gifts of sorts. I wanted cool ideas, not lame ones. This book exceeded my expectations. Crafting with Nature offers a large number of various nature-based crafting ideas. Not only is practicality found throughout several projects, but also materials so easily accessible for whichever ideas one chooses to indulge in. This book is sensibly organized into sections which feature woodland ingredients, or household pantry goods, among others. My biggest concern was whether or not this book would be more regionally focused. If it is, I'm glad I'm in the region in which the lavenders can thrive, the grape vines can be found in my back yard, rosemary landscapes nearly every local gas station, and a forest of branches, pine cones, and acorns is but a hop, skip, and a jump away. The crafting projects are plentiful, each interesting, practical, or whimsical in its own way. There are clear guidelines for creating bath salts, natural jewelry, decorations, and more without any complicated procedures to worry about. No matter where one begins with this book, it is certain to end with satisfaction in your project. So many fun, accessible, and affordable ideas from which to choose. Crafting with Nature is certainly worth exploring.
